

1996 CBC

Dear Area Coordinators and Feeder Counters:

The 1996 CBC with 54 species was an average count for our area (highest count is 63 species). The total individuals of 13,899 was slightly below average.

Again in 96, very few rare birds were sighted, the yellow-headed blackbird was the only unusual bird and needed verification forms. White-thr. sparrow, belted kingfisher, northern pintail duck, bald eagles, northern harriers, sharp-shinned hawks, hooded merganser, brown-headed cowbird, coot, brown creeper, golden-cr. kinglet and snowy owl were other unusual species. Unusual high numbers: 22 Am robins, and good numbers of most finches. Unusual low numbers: 41 common merganser, few other waterfowl species seen. Screech and great horned owl numbers were good.

Cedar waxwing, ruffed grouse, horned larks, red-winged blackbird, snow buntings and gray partridge are birds that we know or are relatively certain are in this area but we failed to see them on the count day.

Weather was windy and overcast with early morning snow flurries, snow cover was less than 1", mostly bare ground. The early morning temperature of 17 with a wind gusting to 28 mph was cold. The strong wind all day kept the birds low and inactive.

Seven more people participated this year (31) than last year in the field. Feeder counts were up (16) from last year (9). Party hours were up from last year. Party miles (715) were up 12 miles. Hours and miles owling almost the same as last year.

Overall it was another good count for the Green Bay area thanks to your help. Please share this information with others in your group.
